## **Why are Captions Important?**

- 1. Tells the story behind the photo emphasizing the five W's and H:
  - Who
  - What
  - Where
  - When
  - Why
  - How
- 2. Preserves the story behind the picture.

## Parts of a Caption

- 1. Lead-in
- 2. Descriptive Sentence
- 3. Background Sentence

# Lead-in serves as a mini-headline for the photo

- ✓ Short, catchy and clever mini-headline
- ✓ Grabs the reader's attention
- ✓ Captures overall mood of the photo
- ✓ Links the photo to the info provided in the caption

# Descriptive sentence tells what is going on the photo

- ✓ Colorfully describes the photo using descriptive adjectives and adverbs
- ✓ ALWAYS written in present tense and active voice

# **Background sentence provides** information beyond the photograph

- ✓ Provides information that can not be obtained by looking at the photo
- ✓ Relates to information provided in the descriptive sentence
- ✓ Always written in the past tense and active voice



**Types of Captions**

There are 6 Types of Captions. This refers specifically to the Descriptive Sentence of the caption.

#### 1. ADJECTIVE

Rainy conditions can't dampen the spirits of the varsity cheerleaders as they dance to . . .

#### 2. ADVERB

Attentively watching for their cues, members of the marching band entertain the halftime crowd . . .

#### 3. COMMON NOUN

Time expires as AP Language and Composition students complete their difficult final exam . . .

#### 4. DIRECT QUOTE

"The new SAT format is much tougher for me since I don't write very well," said junior Todd Fritz as . . .

#### 5. GERUND

Jogging is a popular choice for teens looking to maintain a healthy lifestyle . . .

#### 6. PARTICIPLE

Concerned students look on from a distance as emergency crews arrive to

### **Caption Type Usage**

- Adjective and adverb captions are preferred because they are generally more interesting than the others
- ➤ Limit the use of gerund and participles because they are often overused, which impacts variety
- > Do not use proper noun captions... NEVER begin a caption with the person's name or even an adjective that directly modifies it.

# **Caption Examples: The Good, The Bad & The Ugly**

#### The Ugly:

John Boyle runs with the football versus Frederick.

#### The Bad:

Running down the sideline versus Frederick is John Boyle. The Knight's won the game 28-13

#### The Average:

**Big Gain.** Running down the sideline, senior John Boyle returns a punt versus Frederick. The Knights came back to win the game 28-13

#### The Good:

Off to the races. Slicing through the Cadets' punt coverage, senior John Boyle (9) follows lead-blocker John Smith (11) down the sideline for 35 yards versus Frederick. Boyle, who was selected to the All-Area team, set a league record with five punt returns for touchdowns.

Another Good Example:

# Caption No, No's

- > **NEVER EVER** write "GAG" captions.
  - o ALWAYS use factual information
- > Don't editorialize
  - o That's when you use adjective and adverbs that overstates the truth.

- Don't use directional leads.
  - O Shown above, left, below, etc.

## **How to Write a Caption**

#### **Step 1: Research**

✓ Compile all relevant information

#### **Step 2: Compose a Rough Draft**

✓ Write a description and background

#### **Step 3: Create Lead In**

✓ Creatively Link action to information

### Step 4: Edit with a Rubric

✓ Thoroughly evaluate against the caption rubric

# **More About Captions...**

#### **Caption Formatting:**

- ✓ Photo Bys give credit to the photographer.
  - o When the photographer is a student it appears as the following: Photo by John Smith.
  - When the photographer is an adult or our professional photographer it appears as the following: Photo courtesy of Bryn-Alan
  - O Photo by's appear at the end of the caption in italics. Photo bys begin one space after the end of the last sentence of the caption
  - For example: Eat my dots! Showing off his old-school video game skills, English teacher John Darrell plays his way to the high score on Ms. Pac-Man at Venutti's Pizzeria.
     Darrell's A.P. Literature class held a benefit dinner for Hurricane Katrina victims on October 3. Photo by John Smith
  - o There is no period after a photo by
- ✓ Single space after a period.
- ✓ Bold the lead in of a caption. See example above.

### **Sports Captions:**

- ✓ Identify both the school's players and opponents by jersey number and name
- ✓ Include the starting position of player to add depth to the description of the action
- ✓ Consider those players and plays that led up to this action shot
- ✓ Tell result of this play or the out come of the game

## **Group Photo Identifications:**

- ✓ Begin with the name of group
- ✓ Identify from left to right, but don't write that as part of caption
- ✓ Give clear row designation of Front Row, Second Row, Third Row, Back Row
- ✓ Row designation and group should be set in a different emphasis than the names in the identifation
- ✓ Include first and last names of group members
